2018 Dons and Doñas Selected



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We continue to have a strong organization and a popular Museum and Botanical Garden. The Museum offers the public a great way to learn about what it was like to live here "back in the day," when the area was homesteaded and this was a small rural community. The Botanical Garden has developed a focus on native bee and butterfly habitat and provides ongoing educational events for the community. Our current membership is 417 and we are mailing this newsletter to 675 people. If you are not currently a member, please consider joining.

Major maintenance was needed in the Garden this past year. With a grant from the Meadowlarks, we were able to remove three large dead trees. We used a grant from the City to build a presentation platform for the Chumash stone artifacts.

The Stan Daily Scholarship is well established now, encouraging high school students to do historical research. This year, we received so many good essays that we decided to give four awards. They are: Luke Vankeersbilck, ACHS; Rachael Ryan, ACHS; Lily Erickson, Rio Mesa and Madeline Kildee, Newbury Park

Two college interns and two high school students have been working with us in the Museum, and we initiated a relationship with the History Department at Cal Lutheran University. We are making significant progress in archiving, curating, and restoring our artifacts, exhibits and maps. Thanks to Joy Todd for her initiative and passion in doing this important work.

Based on the assurance provided with our new 25-year lease, we have decided to enlarge the Museum. We have engaged the architectural firm of Lauterbach and Associates to design the building expansion, and we have established planning and fundraising committees to move ahead with the project. We began the permitting process with the City and the design plans were displayed at our recent Annual Meeting.

We are excited about the prospect of building on to the Museum, expanding our footprint, adding another 1400 sq. feet of floor space, and giving the building the appearance of a traditional craftsman-style home. This expansion is a big step for us and it will produce significant benefits in terms of our image and capabilities, help meet the needs of an expanding organization, and allow us to show and tell more about the rich heritage of Pleasant Valley.

I see a day in the near future when the Museum building is easily recognized, has a large exhibit room with a sequence of updated displays and a dedicated room for the Fulkerson Library, and draws in many people to experience what it was like to live here in the early days.

2018 Museum Expansion Fundraising Campaign

After decades of effort, we now have a long-term lease from the city, so we are finally able to kick off our "31-years-in-planning" Museum Expansion Fundraising Campaign! We plan to build additional space and really create a museum edifice we can be proud of!

The expansion project will consist of remodeling the existing building, adding approximately 1,400 sq. ft. of new building, and making improvements to the parking lot. The new building will add much needed display and storage space, plus a dedicated accession and restoration area.

Our goal is to raise \$800,000 to plan, modify, and build this glorious new museum.

We are actively pursuing grants from the State of California and local foundations. We have submitted our preliminary expansion plans, completed by our chosen architects, Lauterbach & Associates, to the Camarillo City Planning Dept. for their review and approval, and plan to have a 3-D Model of the expansion available for viewing this summer.

At the same time, we are redesigning our Website. The exciting new Website will include a way to pay membership dues, donations and pledges; view our calendar of upcoming events; information on new displays; information on artifacts; the Jack Fulkerson Library; our collections of photographs, clippings and maps; and articles and general information regarding the rich history of the Pleasant Valley community. And of course, continuing news on the expansion!

SPEAKERS SERIES

We are already well into the 2018 series of events at the museum. Yet, there is more to come! So, make sure you have your schedule up to date so that you don't miss out on any of the activities throughout the summer of 2018.

On June 28th at 6:30 p.m., we will welcome John Nichols from the Santa Paula Historical Society who will speak about the St. Francis Dam failure that took place 90 years ago. BEE AND BUTTERFLY DAY

The Pleasant Valley Historical Society Garden is happy to invite you to our annual celebration of Native Bees and Butterflies. Our speaker on Native Bees (and pollinators of all kinds) is biologist Michael Glenn from the Ventura County Office of the US Fish and Wildlife Service, He will tell how to provide for them in our home gardens and how to protect them. He is a specialist in planting California native plants in urban and school gardens to enhance the attraction of pollinators and to offer sources of nutrition for many pollinators under stress from habitat loss.

Michael leads the US Fish and Wildlife Schoolyard Habitat Program in Ventura County. He was nominated by the service for the regional Rachel Carson award, "Sense of Wonder", for his work with children, inspiring their interest in the natural world. We are very pleased to present Michael as one of our inspirational speakers.

Our second presenter will be familiar to you if you have attended previous events. Lynne Godin and Rick Krause will describe their years of work with Monarch Butterflies. Lynne always thrills the child in us all by releasing Butterflies. She shows the life cycle of the Monarch with living examples of caterpillar to chrysalis to butterfly. Our event is from 1 to 4 p.m. in the Charles Honn Botanical Garden and is, as always, free to all. Bring your children, and your inner child.






