WHAT WERE YOU DOING IN 1962?

Well, if you were living in Camarillo, you had a lot on your plate.

In January, Messers Forbes, Kildee, Jones, Hibbits, DeLay and Brunken were elected directors of the newly formed Park and Recreation District.

If you were doing your shopping at the Camarillo Heights Market, eggs were 45 cents a dozen. At the State Food Market, frying chickens were 35 cents a pound. Otherwise, you had to make a trip to Oxnard. Cooley's Drugs was open on Ventura Blvd. to serve your perscription needs. Earl Joseph Shoes was having a big sale. Their specials were priced at \$8.90 and \$9.90. I hope you stocked up!

In February, the citizens of Camarillo were recovering form a massive storm that caused two deaths. The Community Center on Ventura Blvd. was used as an evacuation center. On a happier note, Fulkerson's Hardware in Somis celebrated its 50th Anniversary.

In March, ground was broken on the first Shopping Center to be built in Camarillo. It was to be called Ponderosa Square and it was going to include, in addition to a Von's Supermaket, Bob Kildee's Shop for Men, Ray Liddle Jewelers, McMahan's Furniture Store, Thrifty Drugs and a major bank. This was really exciting news. In the same month, the new library opened in its own building in Dizdar Park. Mrs. Yagodka became the new head librarian. St. John's Hospital in Oxnard celebrated its 50th Anniversary as well.

In May, there was a dedication ceremony held at Point Mugu for the new Airbase. Bi-Rite Market on Ventura Blvd. celebrated its 6th year in Camarillo. Their special was 2 pounds of grapes for 29 cents. The Camarillo News went from Sunday only editions to twice weekly papers. Work began on the construction of the 101 Freeway.

In June, the School Board announced that they would build two new schools because Camarillo was growing so rapidly. There were announcements practically every month of new tracts to be built here. The State Hospital was experiencing growth as well; it was now the 5th largest Mental Hospital in California. 3-M bought a site for a new manufacturing facility.

In September, school opened. There were five schools in the district: Las Posas, El Rancho, Los Altos, Pleasant Valley and Camarillo Heights. Elvis Presley visited Ventura County and made an appearance at the Fair. Patricia Lowe was crowned Miss Camarillo 1962.



Jungleland opened in Thousand Oaks in July. This was a must see when out of town relatives were visiting.

The Arcade Shopping Center, a mini mall on Las Posas Road near Arneill Road, had it grand opening in October. This was also the month of the Cuba Missle Crisis when local citizens made a run on the markets to stock up in case of war. Our first Bowling Alley opened with much fanfare on October 10. The rest of the Ponderosa Plaza would not open until Spring of 1963.

In November, Camarillo's first Fire Chief E. C. Putnam reired after 22 years of service.

Camarillo's First Christmas Parade was held in December. It was estimated that over 10,000 people watched the bands and floats go by. Considering that our total population at the time was less than 20,000, it goes to show the sense of community and public spirit that was a mark of this little, not-yet city.

Editor's Note: These fascinating bits and pieces were ripped from the headlines of the 1962 Camarillo News. Of the businesses cited, only Vons, Earl Joseph's Shoes and Bob Kildee's for Men have survived in other locations. The Christmas Parade goes on but with fewer spectators, fewer bands. The Miss Camarillo Pagent has not been held for several years. On the other hand, we have gained more markets, Cal State University at Channel Islands, the Outlet Center and other shopping malls, lots of fast food restaurants and rush-hour traffic. That is the price of growth.

Things were a lot different in 1899. The Museum was recently given a letter from Adolfo to Isabel. They had been visiting friends in Wheeler's Springs. He had returned home and she had stayed for a longer visit. In the letter, he assures her that his trip back to Camarillo was pleasant, that folks at the Ranch were well and that the cook was going to make plum jam the next day. Incidentally, he reported that a wagon in need of repair was serviced by Vickers and Sheldon for \$2.50 and they did a fine job. He asked that she write and tell him when she was planning to come home.

Things have certainly changed in the past 100 years!


