DONS AND DOÑAS 45th CELEBRATION

This tradition began in 1965 with the naming of men and women whose names were synonymous with early greater Camarillo. They were presented as honorary Dons and Doñas (Spanish for gentlemen and ladies). It was a way of paying tribute to the descendents of the pioneering families who contributed much to the enrichment of the area and a nod to Adolfo and Isabella Camarillo, for whom the city was named.

The 1965 celebration was a Fiesta at the Camarillo Ranch home. It was held in honor of the City of Camarillo's first birthday and the 101st birthday of Don Adolfo Camarillo. The other events of the day included a blessing of the animals, a Mexican breakfast hosted by the Optimists, a dedication of the courthouse, a barbeque and the awarding of Charter Citizen certificates to all residents who were living in Camarillo at the time of its incorporation.

That year, those selected as Dons and Doñas were Gene Putnam, our first fire chief; Max Riave, general store owner; Ike Norman, the village blacksmith; Clifford Glenn, rancher; Fred Stein, post master; Marie Fulton, teacher; Rosa Petit, a daughter of Adolfo and Isabella Camarillo; Lena Jones, bookkeeper at the Ranch for 35 years; Eva Hayes and Julia Sotelo, long time residents.

Today's Dons and Doñas have been chosen from area residents who have lived in Camarillo and the surrounding area. Included are men and women whose family and/or personal history is significant in the history of the Pleasant Valley and others who have a record of outstanding community service for 20 years or more. SPRINGVILLE CHURCH WINDOW

Early this year, a letter arrived at our museum from Mr. William (Bill) Allen of Visalia, California, requesting information regarding the Springville Church. Mr. and Mrs. Allen's home contained a large church window that, as it was told to them, had been from the Springville Church. An expert in church windows from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, had verified that it came from the late 1800's. Mr Allen is a historian and had written an article about the present-day Springville, California. It is a small village of approximately 1800 residents some fifty miles southeast of Fresno. It is is situated in the foothills on the way to Sequoia National Park. Originally, it had been called Daunt before changing its name in 1911. In 1905, our Springville community, along with the Post Office by that name ceased to exist. According to Mr. Allen, when the name and Post Office became available, Daunt residents assumed them both.

Mr. and Mrs. Allen visited our museum on February 28th, and were given a tour not only of the museum, but to Wood Road where the original church and cemetery were located. They also visited the Pleasant Valley Bible Church to examine the bell that is located in the front patio. It came from the Springville Church. We also studied some of their church windows which may be of the same vintage as the Springville Church.

In preparation for their visit, I did research on the former community of Springville which was located where the outlet center and airport are today. It was during that research that I learned there were two cemeteries in our area, one belonging to the Pleasant Valley Baptist Church (presently, Dizdar Park) and one located beside the Springville Church. Many of the remains from both cemeteries were transferred to Ivy Lawn and are listed in their register.



The Allens were most interested in viewing the carved replica of the church that is on display in our museum (see below). It was carved from wood saved by Mrs. Sadie Newell when the church was demolished. E.W. Daily made the replica. To the left is Mrs. Allen, standing by the church window that graces their home. When they entertain, they introduce their window by placing a collection plate nearby for donations.

The garden continues to be a great attraction. We have done extensive trimming these last few months and have added 50 new native plants to our collection.

"Teddy Roosevelt" told us that his roommate in college was one of the Oxnard brothers who gave their name to our neighboring city.







ADOLFO ROAD Named for Adolfo Camarillo

Don Adolfo Camarillo was born in San Buenaventura, CA, on October 28, 1864. When his father passed away in 1880, Adolfo, age 16, his brother Juan, and their Mother Martina, jointly inherited Calleguas Rancho. Their sisters received other properties. Adolfo assumed operation responsibility for the approximately 10,000-acre Rancho. At age 21, he graduated from International Business College (Woodbury) and assumed full management. Making "great strides in land cultivation" the Rancho became one of the most valuable in Ventura County. During his lifetime, Calleguas Rancho was one of the largest estates and also one of the oldest, under continuous management and cultivation since the Spanish land grants.

When their Mother passed away, Juan had St. Mary Magdalan Church on Ventura Blvd. built as a monument to her. He became a world traveler, had an audience with the Pope, and left the running of the Rancho to Adolfo. The Rancho was a working farm with crops in barley, corn, alfalfa and grain. Every acre was utilized. Adolfo, along with Joseph Lewis became a pioneer in the raising of lima beans. Eventually they had over 3,000 acres planted in beans with another 2,000 acres of orchards, chiefly walnuts and citrus. Don Adolfo was "considered a leader in agricultural progress in Ventura County and his ranch ranked with the largest and best equipped in California." The dairy was operated by electricity and milked one hundred and fifty high grade cows. Adolfo bred pigs and was a breeder of his beloved famous white Arabian-Morgan horses. Known as one of the foremost stockmen in Southern California, he grew all the livestock feed on the Rancho. In a personal dairy, Adolfo noted the land had many living springs, which gave him the idea to pipe this water underground to turn the Rancho into fertile soil.

In 1888 Adolfo married Isabella Menchaca of Ventura. They had seven children, but only five: Rosa, Ave, Isabel, Frank and Carmen, grew to adulthood. Don Adolfo loved fiestas, rodeos and barbecues, which were often held at the Rancho. He and his family regularly participated in parades on his pure white horses, including the annual Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, CA. They "rode in these parades attired in the costumes of the Dons and Senoritas of early California, saddles and accessories being mounted with exquisite silver". He was an active member of the Rancheros Visitadores, who every spring made a cross-country trek on horseback, visiting the ranches of the Santa Ynez Valley in Santa Barbara County. Following the deaths in 1936 of his wife, Isabella, and his brother Juan, Adolfo curtailed his involvement in all of these colorful activities. He continued to donate both time and money to his community.

Gov. Rolph appointed him a director of the State Agricultural Board in charge of the California State Fair. He was one of three commissioners for the "Century of Progress" International Exposition in Chicago, IL. He served eight years on the Ventura County Board of Supervisors; was a member of the Knights of Columbus of Oxnard; a Grand Knight of the Oxnard Council; President of the Columbian Club; a member of BPOE of Santa Barbara; Native Sons of the Golden West; Vice President of the First National Bank of Ventura; V. P. of the Ojai State Bank of Nordhoff; a Director in the Bank of A. Levy, Inc. of Oxnard; a board member of the Oxnard branch Bank of America; and a director of the Security Bank, Oxnard. Don Adolfo died of pneumonia December 10, 1958 and is interred in the family crypt beneath St. Mary Magdalen Church in Camarillo, alongside his parents, his wife, sisters and brothers.
