He has served on the Board of Directors of Ventura Pacific, the lemon packinghouse, for over 25 years and is active in the Ventura County Citrus Exchange, the U.S. Citrus Science Council and Sunkist, Inc. He has recently branched out to plant fourteen varieties of blueberries.

SALLY GILLESPIE – Sally has taught Sunday School for 25 years at St. Columba's Church where she made lunches for the children attending their school. Charles Honn Botanical Garden

Thanks to the City of Camarillo Tree Crew! On August 27, Bob Pitts came with a crew of 3 men to work on the trees in the garden. They spent the day working with chain saws, pole trimmers and a chipper and it made a tremendous difference in the amount of light which reaches the lower levels of the garden. Marie Jascina and Betty Jo McDonald were there, checking the irrigation system and trimming the smaller shrubs while collaborating with the tree crew. The City Crew did a beautiful and artistic job of trimming and shaping. Our thanks to Kevin Jordensborg of the City of Camarillo and to PVHS's Bob Rust for arranging this very productive day.

The garden has always had an important role in the Historical Society's Mission. As Camarillo becomes more and more urban, the garden gains in its importance. It is our responsibility to keep this small garden jewel at its best. It is time to renovate the irrigation system, to add new understory plants, to paint the tool shed, repair the bridge and trim the hedge.

The garden needs helpers for painting, installing the donated bricks as a patio for the gazebo to expand seating for events, trimming the shrubs and the roses, dead-heading flowers, refurbishing the teak bench, and other small tasks. We need the following items donated: paint, two hoses, hose reel, flowers or roses for the grass border. We welcome youth groups who need a project. Streets of Camarillo:

Do you ever wonder how a city's streets get their names? Camarillo's rich history is told in its street names. Let's start with one of our main roads, Carmen Drive. This street was named after Carmen Camarillo Jones, Adolfo Camarillo's youngest daughter. She lived on the Camarillo Ranch for most of her life. As a child, she lived in the Camarillo house. Later a house just past the side garden was built for her.

On the west side of town where Las Posas curves south, if you go straight ahead instead of following Las Posas, you are on Earl Joseph Drive. Earl owned a shoe store in old town Camarillo. The store was later purchased and moved to Las Posas Plaza but the name remained the same. Earl was elected to the first City Council in 1964 and, because he received the most votes, the council elected him Mayor. He served on the council for eight years and served as Mayor for the first six years.

In one of our earlier Newsletters, we found that Wood Rd. was named for a local man. Many of the streets are named for the early families who owned land along the road. Also we have many streets with Spanish names. What do they mean? If you would be interested in researching road names for the Newsletter, call Liz Daily at 482-1036
