Left: Since the Museum opening in 1988, the once adequate 1,555 sq. ft. of floor space has been overwhelmed – the continuing donations and acquisitions have grown the Museum's Display Area to consume the entire Museum floor space. More space is needed for even more displays, and for allowing attendance to museum functions.

The Right: Expansion Project adds 1,153 sq. ft. of floor space to the Museum. The increased area provides classroom space for interactive school programs and field trips, a dedicated space for the Fulkerson Library, and increased area for the Museum's displays. The original building will also be upgraded remodeled.

In efforts to help minimize the Museum Expansion Project expenses, the museum volunteers have placed all of the Museum artifacts into temporary storage, and have supplied the demolition phase labor for removing the building's interior contents.



SCHOLLE BARN LIVES ON

Recently, we were able to salvage multiple barnwood slats from the Scholle Ranch in Springville. The house and some outbuildings were constructed before 1900. The 1,890-s.f. house that is seen on the property is scheduled to be restored and be part of the tract that will be built at the corner of Springville Road and the 101 freeway. Because there was no effort to save the many outbuildings, they have fallen to disrepair and all will be removed from the property.

MEMORIES OF MORE THAN HOUSES IN CAMARILLO HEIGHTS

The gently rolling hills of Camarillo Heights offer beautiful views that combine country and urban lifestyles. Businesses were once part of the landscape that also accommodated residential and agriculture uses. The affordable land with its rich soil supported a variety of small farms.

Rob Frost, who grew up in the area, recalled "There was **Mr. Humbert** on Las Posas and his small family farm and **Mr. Mason's** avocado farm." **Jess** Mason began successfully experimenting with growing avocados on three acres. It was considered an exotic fruit. He eventually grew thousands of avocado trees from seed. Many of his still-thriving trees are on the corner of Las Posas and Loma Drive. The Mason family called that five-acre plot and comfortable house their home for 25 years.

Today we call the home development *Rancho Tomas*, but it had once been acres of beans, barley and eventually citrus owned by noted farmer **Louis Maulhardt**. His son, Ed, was also a successful farmer. The 150-acre ranch was sold to Los Angeles businessman **Ray Thomas**. Farming continued until 1972 when *Rancho Tomas* was sold for housing development.

Though he is not able to remember the date, "the first mayor of Camarillo, **Earl Joseph**, lived in Camarillo Heights," Rob recalled. His father, **Norman Frost** and friends **Bill Cummings** and Earl Joseph worked for L.G. Maulhardt-International Harvester. The men used the company's heavy construction equipment to prepare the building site for Joseph's home on Alosta Drive.

Big business had been part of the Heights with the Canada Dry Bottling Plant on North Loop. During his childhood, Rob and his friends often played around the abandoned plant. There was a deli-market owned by Mr. and Mrs. **Skedel**. The couple grew grapes and made wine. They also made their own sausage and jerky.

Alice Frost Sweetland recalled "My brother, Rob, had an FFA project heifer named Baby that lived in our backyard on Las Posas Road. There was a chain link fence making a little corral, but one day, for whatever reason, Baby bolted, jumping over the fence and ran through the Heights, through the Las Posas Country Club Golf Course." Three days later Baby was found quietly grazing just off Highway 118.

Small stores and restaurants dotted the area. **Jess Mason's** daughter, **Genevieve Mason Peterson**, recalls **Harry's** (**Manski**) Market "at the north end of Arneill Road, ending at Las Posas Road. It was a very popular gathering place. I remember being at Harry's Market when World War II ended. Car horns blaring and people jumping out of their cars with excitement. The market is where **Bill Mason**, my brother, and I would jump on our bikes after we got home from school and bought our *Twinkies* with pure enjoyment."

"Patrick Kelton and his wife Laura had a grocery store next-door to our house, the corner of Anacapa and Las Posas. It was very small but convenient for some things. We would buy soda and candy there," said Alice. She also recalled "a grocery store where Arneill and Las Posas meet. The owners I remember were the Petersons. Later *Cooley's Pharmacy*, a liquor store, an Urgent Care and Kentucky Fried Chicken occupied the spaces."

Linda Plummer remembers "a nice little market where East Highland comes into North Loop. I would select a large dill pickle out of a jar for probably a nickel or splurge on some ice cream treat." The building was "a wooden structure with a small parking lot right along the edge of North Loop."

Longtime friends, Alice Frost and **Tom Leonard** both remember "a little restaurant at Arneill and Las Posas "owned by *Dot and Walt*. The last name is not recalled, but Tom explained why he remembers the owners' first names. "The restroom doors were identified as Dot for the ladies' room and Walt for the men's room." Alice explained after Dot and Walt's place "another restaurant opened there. It was a steakhouse. It changed hands around 1956 and **Ora Sinclair** reopened it, calling it The Attic.

One of the first physicians in Camarillo was **Dr. Anthony Muff** who lived on Anacapa. His office was not far from PV School on Palm Drive. Rob and his siblings would hope "we got a ride from Dr. Muff. He drove fast." Other days the kids might catch a ride from **Warren Chase** on his way to the Chase Bros Dairy on Fifth Street.

"Bill Isom was a delivery man on Anacapa for Hal Hopkins grocery store. It was across from Higgins' Market on the boulevard and Somis Road," said Rob. He was the father of **Patsy Isom** who was the first Lima Bean Queen. She was crowned in 1954 by Adolfo Camarillo. Patsy married **John Cawelti**.

"Hudson Perry was an appliance man," explained Rob. He had a store in downtown Camarillo. "He also had a "lemon orchard and drove an old Chevy pickup with burned out valves. You could really hear him coming," said Rob as he laughed at the memory. "My dad repaired it for him." Alice recalled one of her mother's small-town Camarillo stories that became big news locally. "Mr. Perry ran into Mrs. Perry's car. Imagine that!"

Robinayre Private Schools


A private girl's school located where the Rancho Lomita tract homes are currently, was started in 1957 in Thousand Oaks, and opened a second campus in Camarillo in 1962 until late 1960s. A long road north from

Los Posas, west of St. Columba's Church, went up through orchards next to a row of eucalyptus trees. The school buildings could not be seen from Las Posas. Robinayre had two locations: one in Thousand Oaks for boys' grades 3-6, and the second in Camarillo for girls' grades 3-12. The rates were \$65 - \$105/month. But it also had a boarding option, so that was added costs.

The sixty resident girls cared for up to thirty horses stabled at the Camarillo campus that were available for lessons for the girls and the public. In June, most of the horses were taken to the Lions Club-operated Camp Bloomfield for the Junior Blind in the Santa Monica Hills for their summer camp sessions.

Robinayre School was promoted as "A non-denominational preparatory and finishing school for average and above average students". Classes offered were Spanish, German, French, tennis, swimming, photography and horse-back riding in addition to state required courses. The principal at one time was Roland Garvin Youtz.


