

# THEY WERE LOST, BUT NOW THEY ARE FOUND!

With the recent renovation of Dizdar Park, two tombstones of pioneer families were unearthed! The sites were in the "North half of Lot 79" which was beneath the library building/Chamber of Commerce on the NW corner of the cemetery. In Val Rains and Sherwood Milleman's book, *They Lived and Died in Pleasant Valley*, 2015, she wrote "very few of the PVC tombstones were moved to ILC (Ivy Lawn Cemetery). Those that were not moved have disappeared and we have been unable to learn how or where." Until now.



The Hill Family

The taller one was for the HILL family. Samuel Hill (1816-1905) and his wife Sarah (Middleton) Hill (1827-1912). Both were born in

England. Samuel came to California in 1850, and to Conejo in 1876. They were buried at PVC and moved to ILC in October 1943 without the monument.

Although Anna "Belle" Sisson's remains were moved to ILC in 1943, for some reason her tombstone was also left behind. At only 12 years old, she was victim of a tragic drowning accident in Piru that took 5 lives. Belle (1888–July 25, 1900) was the daughter of Emerson Sisson, and the granddaughter of Jeremiah

Sisson. Jeremiah and wife, Polly, arrived in PV in 1868 and farmed 44 Acres at the corner of Las Posas/101. He was one of the 3 original trustees of the PV School District.

The city has decided that the best place for the monuments would be with PVHM. They will deliver them to the garden area where they will be placed with signage explaining their journey from PV Cemetery/Dizdar Park to Charles Honn Botanical Garden to be seen again.

# Echo Sound Bites

Just some interesting dates of incorporation of Ventura County's 10 cities:

- 1866, April 2<sup>nd</sup>: San Buenaventura became a city, part of Santa Barbara County.
- 1873, January 1<sup>st</sup>: Ventura become a county, separating from Santa Barbara County.
- 1892: Thomas Bard and D. T. Perkins established Somis as an unincorporated community.
- 1902, April 22<sup>nd</sup>: Santa Paula became a city.
- 1903, June 30<sup>th</sup>: Oxnard became a city.
- 1914, July 10<sup>th</sup>: Fillmore became a city.
- 1921, August 5<sup>th</sup>: Ojai became a city.
- 1948, March 24<sup>th</sup>: Port Hueneme became a city.
- 1964, October 7<sup>th</sup>: Thousand Oaks became a city.
- 1964, October 22<sup>nd</sup>: Camarillo became a city.
- 1969, October 10<sup>th</sup>: Simi Valley became a city.
- 1983, July 1<sup>st</sup>: Moorpark became a city.
- 2025, August 30<sup>th</sup>: PVHM&G's annual Don and Doña recognition BBQ. 😜


