HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE OF DON AND DOÑA

Originally a title reserved for royalty, select nobles, and church hierarchs, it is now often used as a mark of esteem for a person of personal, social or official distinction, such as a community leader of long standing. "Since Don Adolfo was one of the few Califórnio land owners still ranching on his property, which he kept intact during his lifetime, the title of Don was used for him, both in direct address while speaking directly to him, and in referring to him."–Sherry Reynolds.

In 1965, Pleasant Valley Historical Society began the tradition of honoring community citizens. 538 men and women have been honored in the past 58 years.

We select from people nominated each year by the community based on:

- 1. An individual whose family and/or personal history is significant in the root history of the Pleasant Valley. and/or
- 2. An individual who has lived in the area for at least 20 years, and has provided outstanding service to the community and/or to the PVHS during that time.

THE NEED FOR EXPANSION OF THE MUSEUM SITE

We appreciate the flexibility of everyone with the long-awaited construction and expansion of our museum. It is a testament to our volunteers that we are here today and our museum is actively serving the community, even without a completed building. It still serves with speaking engagements, displays, events and school presentations..., anything we are asked to do, we try to do. The City refers agencies to PVHM&G for historic information and historical documentation. We still do it.

We are a museum looking forward. History moves forward. We do not stop at 1900, but look to the more recent past, i.e. the Olszewski display at the entrance today. Mr. Olszewski lived in Camarillo and was a Jr. High teacher at Haydock in Oxnard. He had a dream. He began making his miniatures in his closet in the late 1970s and by the 1980s became Goebel Miniatures of Camarillo. A local company that is now known the world over. A collector of his miniatures, Joyce Wallace, has given our museum over 200 of his creations.

Camarillo was incorporated in 1964, not that long ago in the time of history, but it has a great impact on those who live here. We could have been part of "Oxnard." We have that documentation. The student essay in your program is a report on Camarillo State Hospital, built in 1936 (and onward) and now is CSU-CI, a full University for Ventura County. This is relevant history. People came to our museum to learn about their history. Our class tours were such a success the students brought others on the weekend to tell them about "our" history. How things were done, and the people who made an impact become part of their interest.

There are number of facilities and programs in our communities that cater to children and students. We have found we cater to families. The new addition will allow us to have indoor meetings and programs. A children's corner will feature that classroom relic--a blackboard, and will facilitate our early American Classroom programs, which are loved. We will still focus on "hands-on" displays. Maps will be an important part with the wall space to view them.

Don Carl Anderson Behind-the-scenes Volunteer

With his construction skills, he had a hand in numerous projects in Camarillo.

Arriving in Camarillo in 1955, for 18 years he rented his first cabinetmaker/woodworker located where the Metrolink/ Amtrak parking lot is today from Adolfo Camarillo for \$100/

month. At one time, that building was a stagecoach stop.

With friends and other civic minded citizens, Carl was instrumental in organizing the first Camarillo Christmas parades. Later, he recruited his friend, Hollywood western actor, Walter Brennan to be the Marshal for the 1967 parade. His woodworking skills were needed and appreciated for many float constructions.

During the years 1963-1973, when his four sons were young, he was active in the leadership of a 4-H chapter with Leo Vanoni, a legend in local farming. Carl helped Leo with signage and other construction items for Uncle Leo's Barn at the Ventura County Fair. He taught woodworking skills to 4-H members from all over the County at his shop in Camarillo.

Carl was a Knights of Columbus member for over thirty years holding several leadership positions. He was instrumental in the building of the kitchen/multipurpose room at the Los Posas St. Mary Magdalen Church.

When Formica became popular as a counter top, Carl was the only one in town who could install it. Booths at Dorothy's Chuck Wagon Café and Ottavio's benefited from his skill.

After Carl's wife, Joan, passed away, he became active in the Camarillo Boys & Girls Club Auxiliary. He suggested that the auxiliary run a snack bar for the after school kids, and to be present as a kind older adult to talk with the kids. Carl purchased, delivered and set up beverages. He worked two or more shifts per month, and often would buy pizza for the kids anonymously. He also worked at the early bird bingo monthly.

Carl has been one of the best kind of volunteers—behind the scenes—doing whatever is necessary without fanfare or personal acclaim.

Doña Phyllis Brown Anderson

Active Community Advocate & Humble Benevolent Care Giver

Phyllis, and husband Bennie, came to Camarillo in 1962 where Bennie was employed as a teacher and coach of football and basketball at Hueneme HS. Friends from Oklahoma, Fred and Doris Phipps, enticed them to move here. Long-time friends, Bennie and Fred were in each other's weddings. Phyllis found a job right away as bookkeeper for the newly opened, "The Liguor Shop," owned by M. F. Daily, Jr.



As did many other mothers, Phyllis first started her volunteerism at the schools of their children. 1969 she served as the Block Parent Chairman & In 1972 she became President of the PV Elementary School PTA. 1974 her organizational skills brought her to be President of the Camarillo PTA Council serving all the district schools. She was on a roll.

Involvement didn't stop locally. Phyllis was President of the 12th District PTSA—Ventura County for 1981-1983. Then in 1984 she was elected President of Adolfo Camarillo High School PTSA. In 1984, she served as Parent Representative of the federally funded Teacher Resource Center for the Oxnard UHSD which received an award for its outstanding programs by the CA Educators' Association. While at ACHS, from 1981-2001 she was one of many parents who helped form the ACHS PTA Bingo Committee, and served as bookkeeper until it was dissolved—after raising thousands of dollars to assist sports, academics and its teachers.

Meanwhile, in 1972- 1977 Phyllis was involved with the grassroots Committee Against the Camarillo Airport, walking the streets to generate awareness of the critical situation. Mayor Stan Daily appointed her to the *Transportation Committee for the City of Camarillo* in 1975.

After the death of Bennie in 1985 she was bookkeeper at the Underwood Farms Road Side Stand and later being full time for AVTEK AIR, INC. at the Camarillo Airport until 2000. Hoping that someday the FAA would certificate the AVTEK 400 business Jet, she kept on working voluntarily out of her garage, while working part time as an assistant in the tax office of CKT & Associates well into her 80's. Since 2014, she has worked with the PVHM&G accession team meeting weekly with others.

Involvement with her church, St. Mary Magdalen Church, includes being a Eucharistic Minister, Secretary of the Bereavement Ministry. In 2016 she became a member of the International Society of St. Vincent de Paul, concurrently serving as President of the St. MM Conference and as President of the District which covers Ventura County.

She was the 8th of 10 children all born with red hair! [She still has it] Phyllis has three children— Sharon, Steven, and David and eight grandchildren—Nathan is head football coach at ACHS.



Doña Joni Berger Active Community and Organization Volunteer

Coming from Michigan to Ventura, and now living in Camarillo for close to forty years, Joni has been highly involved in Soroptimist International of Camarillo for 35 years. In addition to serving in every board position and committee chair multiple times, she served as the club President four, non-consecutive

terms. She also served the Camino Real Region of Soroptimist International as District Director to clubs in Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties. Soroptimist is known for their programs helping women and girls to live their best lives.

Since 1997 Joni served as chairperson for the Camarillo Soroptimist Enchilada Sale which her club raised over \$126,000 by rolling and selling 112,206 [but who's counting] chicken, cheese and beef enchiladas. Proceeds from this annual fundraiser helped support Soroptimist signature programs including: Dream It Be It; Live Your Dream; Stop Trafficking, and the Amy McAvoy CSU-CI scholarship.

Joni worked as the volunteer co-chair of the Camarillo Hospice Chili Festival where nearly \$50,000 was raised during the festival benefiting the Camarillo Hospice's volunteer recruiting, training, and placement services programs.

She is currently on the Board of Directors of Temple Adat Elohim (TAE), a synagogue based in Thousand Oaks which serves families in Ventura and LA Counties. She is one of the organizers of the largest event of the year when dozens of community volunteers team together for a Christmas Day dinner serving more than 250 underprivileged Ventura county residents.

Joni held numerous positions in the organization's Sisterhood. With the onslaught of the Covid Pandemic, Joni accepted the leadership position as President for two years, working to keep the organization viable and active while unable to meet in person. She learned new technology skills and encouraged members to stay connected and adopt the new procedures for monthly gatherings via Zoom.

She currently works at Ventura Property Management as a Residential Leasing Agent. Joni enjoys her life as a wife to Jay, mother of Brian who lives in AZ, Kristine Folino Mayberry living in Orange County, and step mother to Micah, Hannah, Ethan, Jesse, grandmother of 9, sister and aunt.

Her personal statement is "the best is yet to be" as she continues living her best life in the City of Camarillo.

Don Lloyd Christie, D.V.M. Veterinarian with passion for Serving



Dr. Christie purchased the Camarillo Veterinary Hospital on Dawson Drive in 1976 from Dr. Josh Meyer. He became the owner-operator for 30+ years. Besides the regular practice, Lloyd offered free veterinary services to guide and service dogs provided by *Guide Dogs of America*, and *Guide Dogs*

for the Blind. He sold the practice to Dr. Song Chong in 2005. He served one year as Secretary of Santa Barbara-Ventura Veterinary Medical Association.

Camarillo-Somis Pleasant Valley Lions Club became his volunteer passion. He has been a member of this club for 46 years. He served as Lions Club Secretary for 14 years, and Newsletter Editor for 15 years. Lloyd has also held positions in the *Lion's District 4A-3*, which serves the tri-counties.

Always active in club fund raising events such as Harvest Festival, Easter Festival, and Fair Parking, he helped serve the famous Lionburgers to benefit areas of sight conservation, hearing, diabetes, childhood cancer and environment.

Dr. Christie was a member of the team providing sight screening for elementary school children. As a certified "Guiding Lion," he was active in establishment of Amber's Light Lions Club of Camarillo and Conejo Valley Lions Club.

He has received numerous awards for his service in *Lions Club International*. He was awarded Life Memberships for the International Club, and *Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation*. Other awards were: Fourth District Student Speakers Foundation All Fellows Award, the Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, Kay Fukashima CA Lions Foundation Fellowship—2 times, and multiple District Excellence Awards.

Don Greg Farrin aka "Manny Hatz"

First, you must understand that his nickname, "Manny Hatz", is so fitting because of his outstanding service to Pleasant Valley Historical Museum and Botanical Garden. Ever since retirement and his availability to PVHS, he has taken on more and more

responsibilities—wearing many hats! His amazing willingness to see needs and jump in to fill them has been a Godsend to our organization.

Volunteering as the museum's IT manager, the next logical step was to become a Museum Board Member and include volunteering as the museum's website (pvhsonline.org) editor; growing and updating the website for museum news, events and accomplishments. He also is Vice-President. After receiving Docent Training, Greg also volunteered monthly as a Docent, and living less than a mile from the museum, was on-call to cover for a docent who was not able to work on a scheduled day, including cleaning, making sure the scheduled docent was able to get in, lock up and feel comfortable while docenting.

The museum's quarterly newsletter, *The Echo*, previously had Betty Sullivan volunteering as the editor for many years, but at 95 years of age, she retired a couple of years ago. Since Betty's retirement, Greg is now volunteering as *The Echo* editor. [Check out the back page of the Echo and you will see, not humble Greg, but "Manny Hatz" listed as Editor!] He has made many upgrades to the quality and readability of the newsletter.

Since 2019, the museum has added 8 buildings to the museum property; 5 display buildings and 3 storage buildings. Greg has volunteered as a carpenter on all 8 buildings, which requires buying and transporting truck-loads of lumber. Additionally, Greg is volunteering as the museum facility manager, responsible for the maintenance of the museum building and botanical gardens. He is "Tractor Technician" for the museum's Allis-Chalmers 1952 tractor kept in our garden. Even now, with the museum closed to the public, he and Karin come up to oversee watering and cleaning the garden.

Don Allen Grizzard-Paul Community and Soccer Volunteer

Paul was born in England, the youngest of 4 children. He attended a technical college and became an Electronics Engineer, but his spare time was taken up with refereeing soccer [or football, as it is known in England]. In 1982 he volunteered to take a team of 12-year-old boys to play soccer in Camarillo. This

was a soccer exchange program between the county of Surrey and Camarillo where the kids stayed with the families for two weeks. Allen immediately fell in love with Camarillo. Two years later on his second tour, the family he was staying with was invited to Mary Grizzard's farewell party when she sold her Somis house.

He soon found out about Mary's willingness to volunteer as she started volunteering him to work for the Ambassadors and of course the Kiwanis Club, where he is now their secretary and advisor for two high school Key Clubs. His love for the game of soccer made it impossible not to volunteer as a referee for AYSO and had the opportunity of coaching the Camarillo team against the Brits (we won). Once he started finding it difficult to keep up with the kids refereeing, he took over coaching the VIP Special Needs kids and adults in soccer and basketball. Allen always says that he did not move to America, he moved to Camarillo and will never leave.

In 1992 Mary was the first female to join the *Kiwanis Club of Camarillo* where she has served as President four times, each time making the club distinguished. The *Camarillo Kiwanis Club* was started in 1966 by Don George Thayer. His wife, Doña Betty Thayer could not join because at that time Kiwanis was strictly an "all boys" club. In 1987, delegates at the 72 Annual Kiwanis International Convention voted to end the ban on women members. Mary couldn't wait to become a member and 5 years later she started her active involvement.

She served as the Regional Advisor for High School KIWIN'S Div. of *Key Club*; started two *Key Club* youth groups at the California Youth Correctional Facility where she also served on their Advisory Council. Represented the club at many international conventions including in Taiwan and Tokyo.

Again, a trend-setter, she was one of the first women Deputy Sheriffs to be on patrol in the Ventura County. After she received her BS from Cal Lutheran, she became a Financial Planner and an active member of the Camarillo Chamber of Commerce. After marrying Allen in 1986, she became the Dean of the *West Coast University* extension in Camarillo.

Doña Mary Grizzard-Paul Kiwanis Club Trailblazer

Volunteering for many City events, along with Allen, she joined the Camarillo Ambassadors who represent the City. She still is a very active Kiwanian, loves to read, attend fun events, and going to the opera.



Mary was born in New Jersey, number 2 of 10 children. Her family moved to CA in 1959 and lived in the SF Valley, Simi Valley, and after marriage, built a house in Somis. She had three sons, Shawn, Mike and Ryan and is blessed with five granddaughters.

As far as service to the community, Mary and Paul were jointly involved in the same activities. They married in 1985, and the rest is a joint story.

Allen and Mary's involvement with Kiwanis includes organizing food drives to support local food pantries and a variety of events. They assisted in providing breakfasts for participants of *American Cancer Society Relay for Life* and *Ventura County Autism Society Aut2Run* events. The couple has worked with students in the KIWIN'S Clubs at Adolfo Camarillo, Rio Mesa, and Rancho Campana High Schools. With their participation in these clubs, the students learn valuable leadership and team skills. They have also raised funds for the annual George M. Thayer Memorial Scholarship for students at these three high schools.

Two major community projects which are important to Allen and Mary were raising funds for playground equipment and their support of kidSTREAM. They learned that children with special needs could not always enjoy the equipment at the Community Center Park. They partnered with other organizations to raise funds for the design, purchase and installation of playground equipment for children with special needs which opened in 2016.

They also enabled the club to purchase five Magic Spun Chairs that will help children especially those suffering from Autism. Allen, Mary, and members of the KIWIN'S as well as at Camarillo Kiwanis have spent countless hours assisting the kidSTREAM staff with organizing the space and helping with their events.

For many years, Allen has coached AYSO VIP soccer players and teams. This program provides a quality soccer experience for children and adults whose physical or mental disabilities make it difficult to successfully participate on mainstream teams.

Allen and Mary continue to show their commitment to our community. Allen always says that he did not move to America, he moved to Camarillo and will never leave!



Don Chuck Spence Various Volunteer Jobs

After growing up in western Pennsylvania and spending six years as a pilot in the Air Force, Chuck and Jo moved to Camarillo in July of 1979, as a pilot with American Airlines. For the first years, they were growing their family of two

daughters, and settling into the California lifestyle. These years also included a threeyear furlough from American Airlines, when he worked for an aerospace company in Oxnard.

His first volunteer involvement was with American Youth Soccer Organization Region 68 Board. Chuck was Treasurer of this board from 1987-1994. He was also a co-founder of the AYSO Camarillo Strawberry Cup. This is an annual Invitational tournament for boys ages 10-14, and girls 10-19 that meets for two days on two different weekends. Large event!

In the mid-to-late 1990s, his volunteer efforts were extended nation-wide as the Chairman of a national committee with the *Allied Pilots Association*, which is the national union for American Airline pilots.

With the schools, Chuck was President of the Camarillo Heights School Site Council from 1986-1988. He was Treasurer of the PVSD Camarillo Academic Olympics Board from 2006-2012.

He was a volunteer tax preparer from 2007-2009, and then became the Administrator for the entire *Ventura County Volunteer Income Tax Assistance* [VITA] from 2010-2015. Chuck started in 2017 and continues to volunteer for the *AARP TCE Program* [Tax Counseling for the Elderly].

The Friends of the Camarillo Library Board also has benefitted from his expertise with money. He became Treasurer in 2008 and still serves in that role. He says that "when you look after the money, you know what is going on in an organization."

Chuck retired as a pilot from American Airlines in 2007. In the 44 years of living in Camarillo, Chuck and Jo have had the opportunity to move almost anywhere – but why would a person leave here?

Doña **JoAnn "Jo" Spence** Multi-organization Volunteer



Jo recalls that much of her volunteer time revolved around their two daughters' activities. Church was a natural start for her as she taught Sunday School and served on the *St. Columba's Preschool Board*. Both Chuck and Jo had early volunteer positions in AYSO. She helped chair the snack bar for several years and also as Treasurer until she realized her husband was much more suited for that job!

Then as their older daughter, Erin, became disenchanted with playing soccer, they joined Indian Maidens and became involved with leadership there. Finally, both daughters were little maidens and she served as Big Chief of the *Camarillo YMCA Indian Maidens*. Then their younger daughter, Lindsay, became the soccer player and they continued to support and be involved with AYSO and All-Stars well into her junior high years.

Jo served on several committees with the Pleasant Valley School District and become very interested in, and volunteered to be the School Coordinator for *Camarillo Academic Olympics* (CAO) from Camarillo Heights Elementary School. She coached numerous Super Quiz Teams at Camarillo Heights and Monte Vista and went on to chair the Super Quiz portion of CAO for some years. Jo taught 6th grade at Camarillo Heights for 5 years and then was chosen to transition the 6th grade to the Monte Vista. She completed her teaching career as Supervising Teacher of Community Home Education for Pleasant Valley School District for 10 years where she assisted students and parents in Camarillo to navigate learning from home.

Her daughters and she participated in *National Charity League of Ventura County* and they volunteered together at numerous venues throughout the county and in Camarillo. She credits NCL also with paving the way for another passion with membership in *Las Patronas Auxiliary of Assistance League of Ventura County*. Las Patronas was an organization that supported the philanthropies of Assistance League by honoring exceptional young women as seniors in high school by presenting them as Debutantes. Jo served Las Patronas in multiple capacities for twenty years and eventually served as Chairman of the organization for two consecutive years.

The logical transition for her was to join the parent organization of Assistance League of Ventura County (ALVC). Her most recent past position with ALVC was Scholarship Chairman where she served as liaison between California State University-Channel Islands and ALVC where they sponsor 4 scholarships for students majoring in science or math. Currently Jo serves ALVC as 1st Vice-President Membership.

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Don Tony Trembley Public servant, Health Care, and Youth



Tony and Kathy specifically chose Camarillo over many other locations in the state in 1983 when they moved here after finishing postgraduate educations at UC Davis. Tony states, "We love the friendliness and the family focus of our Pleasant Valley community, its geographic beauty and our wonderful climate."

He has been involved in helping advance health care in our community through the *St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital Foundation Board*, where he was past chairman, and as a director for the Community Boards for St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital and *St. John's Regional Medical Center*, and for *Camarillo Hospice*.

He has been past Chair and/or board member of a variety of organizations, including Camarillo Chamber of Commerce, Ventura County Catholic Healthcare West, and United Way of Ventura County. History of Camarillo State Mental Hospital "HOTEL CALIFORNIA"

2023 Daily Scholarship Essay Winner Plates clatter in the kitchen, smell of bacon sizzling, a 78 year old woman wakes and doesn't know where she is. Her walls are white, she is confused, "where is my baby?" A foul stench of urine fills the hallways. Nurses hustle down the corridors, with no time to spare, patients need to be showered, medicated, and fed. Sounds of moans and groans fill the air, sadness floods the rooms, and screams of terror chill the bone; a new day has begun at Camarillo State Hospital, it is 1962.

The present California State University Channel Islands (CSUCI) was once a psychiatric hospital, which was established in 1936. It was known as Camarillo State Mental Hospital and treated patients with developmental disabilities and mental illness.

The California Department of Institutions built the hospital as refuge for local hospitals because there was limited federal funding, poor living conditions, overcrowdedness, institutions and prisons were weak and failing. Why Camarillo? Farmland was ample and fertile, land was cheap, easy access to large mental hospitals, and institutions in Los Angeles County.

In 1929, \$1,000,000 was offered to buy the land and buildings by the California Legislature to build a state hospital in Camarillo. Joseph P. Lewis and Adolfo Camarillo, both Agriculturists, owned 8600 acres called Lewis Ranch and sold 1500 acres of this for \$415,000.

Once news broke out in Camarillo that an "asylum" was going to be built, protesters spoke out. They were worried about their houses

depreciating and the proximity of insane people near their wives and children. Supporters of the institution argued the hospital had the potential to create a large and consistent payroll for members in the city of Camarillo. Over 1,000 people would be given employment as a result of the hospital.

The groundbreaking ceremony took place on August 15, 1933, with Mr. and Mrs, Adolfo Camarillo, Josephine Lewis, Governor Rolph, and Dr. Toner in attendance. The new hospital project was a

result of an agreement between the Public Works Administration and the State of California.

The task of constructing the building was given by state architect, George McDougall. The hospital was expected to house 7,000 patients and 700 staff, homes for superintendent and officials. The main focus was designing the hospital with dormitories, administration buildings,



a dairy, treatment facilities, shops, roads and landscaped gardens. McDougall wanted a cottage-style setting whereby the proposed children's unit held over 150 adolescent youths in four separate duplex cottages, with each cottage holding over 36 children. They constructed a receiving and isolation unit adjoining the administration building and the central dining room. The school, domestic space, chapel, gym, and therapy center, would each be housed in separate buildings.

McDougall wanted the design to blend in with the historical

architecture of Ventura County, and chose the structure of San Buenaventura Mission showing red tile roofs and white pueblo walls. It was important to McDougall that the hospital setting would be surrounded by the natural beauty of rolling hills, flowers, and greenery and would result in a more



tranquil resort rather than a stale-looking hospital with no life. This eliminated a dark cloud over the hospital.

On October 12, 1936 the Camarillo State Hospital administration hosted the opening ceremony. Members of the community sat in chairs on the beautiful lawns that faced the Spanish-style building to celebrate this wonderful moment. Doctors, therapy workers, nurses,



and volunteers all clapped at the announcement of the opening. The total amount of hospital cost was approximately \$10,000,000 and, at completion, was the largest mental hospital in the world.

The first patients were adult men and in 1937, 300 women patients were transferred to Camarillo from other hospitals. In

1947, the hospital opened a ward for children wth developmental disabilities. Later, a Children's Treatment Center was constructed and occupied in 1955.

The hospital closed down in 1997 for two reasons. In 1967, Governor Ronald Reagan, signed the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act, which impacted state hospital populations. In 1996, Governor Peter Wilson cited the facility and found that in 1954 there were 7,266 patients, but it only had 871 patients in 1996. The hospital costs had also increased and these factors closed one-quarter of the facility and on June 30th, 1996, the hospital was closed.

Cheers of joy, squeals of delight, it's Friday, school is out. A new day has passed at California State University Channel Islands, but moans and groans of the past still remain.....
