Message from Past President



St. John's Seminary's Doheny Gutenberg Bible

Carrie Estelle Betzold was working as a telephone operator when she met Edward Doheny, a self-made businessman who struck it rich in the Los Angeles oil fields. Devout Catholics, during their thirty-year marriage, they would support churches, charities, and libraries. After Doheny's death in 1935, Estelle honored her husband's memory with extraordinary donations to St. John's Seminary. Work had begun on the Edward Laurence Doheny Memorial Library designed by architect Wallace Neff. The three-story building would house the working library on the first floor. The second floor could contain the rare books collection, which eventually included one of the world's most rare books, the Gutenberg Bible. In 1939 Estelle was elevated to the honorary title of Papal Countess by Pope Pius XII.

The library, dedicated in 1940, contained rare books, manuscripts, paper weights, and paintings, valued at \$1,000,000. For years Estelle sought a Gutenberg Bible. In 1944 Mrs. Doheny suffered a severe hemorrhage in her left eye instantly losing its eyesight. The right eye had shown symptoms of glaucoma. Eventually she was almost completely blind. That did not stop Estelle from pursuing her goal. In 1950, her bid of \$70,093 was successful. At the seminary, it was kept in a vault, behind a locked gate and protected by two armed guards. Strict regulations limited scholarly access. Years later restrictions were reduced.

Rita Faulders, antiques expert, rare books librarian, and longtime member of Pleasant Valley Historical Museum, was the last librarian of the Doheny Library (1980-1988). She along with her husband, Dr. Charles R. Faulders, who held advanced degrees in mechanical engineering, played key roles in having the ancient book analyzed for the chemical profiles contained within the ink and its pages. It would help explain Gutenberg's printing process.

Financial difficulties at the seminary led to the decision by the archdiocese to sell the collection. Rita was on staff when Christie's held six auctions over two years. Under Mrs. Doheny's will, the proceeds of the sale were to be used for religious and educational purposes. In 1987, then Archbishop Roger Mahony explained "the tuition for seminarians has risen since Mrs. Doheny first began her gifts in 1940, from \$100 a year to \$20,000." He also explained "insurance restrictions are now so severe that we can no longer obtain insurance coverage on the full value of the collection. The auction included what Mrs. Doheny considered the "crown jewel."

The Doheny volume of the Gutenberg Bible was one of 47 known surviving copies of the 42-lines-per column Gutenberg Bible which Johannes Gutenberg first printed in 1449 or 1450. It was not among the 21 complete copies. A complete Gutenberg Bible contains Volumes I and II.

The Doheny bible contained only one volume, the Old Testament. It was considered incomplete. Described as in pristine condition and in its original binding, it sold at auction for \$5.39 million to Maruzen Co. Ltd of Tokyo, Japan, Japan's biggest bookseller. The auction sales totaled \$13.6 million. The archdiocese planned to fund a foundation intended to increase the enrollment of seminarians. As of 2019 the Doheny Gutenberg Bible was locked away in a Keio vault and inaccessible. Since then, it has been digitized by the Keio University in Tokyo, Japan and is available for public viewing online: Keio University Gutenberg, Tokyo, Japan Hubay 45 (https://dcollections.lib.keio.ac.jp/en/gutenberg).

Two campuses at St. John's Seminary

Citing lack of enrollment and financial problems in 2003, the archdiocese decided to close the 42-year-old undergraduate college. In 2017 a developer, Shea Homes, proposed a 300-home active senior community. With just one exception, the undergrad college buildings were razed. The only surviving undergrad college building is the 1961 library. It can be seen on the bluff overlooking Somis Road.

The graduate seminary, founded in 1939, is still active today. The historic chapel, Edward Laurence Doheny Memorial Library and residence halls are still in use and carefully maintained and preserved.

Remembering Tweedy

PVHM was recently presented with a replica Springville Street sign from the tract signage that honors all the first City Council members elected in 1964. Edith "Tweedy" Camarillo Rouce was elected out of

a field of 26 candidates. Charlotte Craven also presented PVHM with Tweedy's council nameplate and two of her childhood dolls. Tweedy's

nameplate for meetings was, COUNCILMAN, even though she protested! Tweedy proposed our City motto, "Las Personas son la Ciudad," at the first council meeting. She was a teacher



for twenty years in PVSD, co-founder of "Camarillo Beautiful," on the VC Fair Board, a charter member of PVHS, a 1979 "Doña," on the county and state Democratic Central Committees, organized the first Camarillo Fiesta in 1965, and was part of anything in Camarillo that promoted children, heritage and beauty! She died in 1988 at age 79.



Part of Mayor Kevin Kildee's presentation read: "These items are a meaningful tribute to Tweedy's legacy and a reflection of Camarillo's history. We are proud to support the PVHS's mission to preserve and share our city's rich heritage. Thank you for your dedication to keeping Camarillo's history alive."






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
